The First Unitarian Universalist Society of Exeter (FUUSE) welcomes all who enter peacefully, regardless of creed, race, ethnicity, sexual orientation or gender identity.

At FUUSE, we are people of all ages, many backgrounds, and many beliefs. We are brave, curious and compassionate thinkers and doers. We create spirituality and community beyond boundaries, working for more justice and more love in our own lives and in the world.

In the pages that follow, we hope to shed a little light on what it means to be a Unitarian Universalist ("UU") and to help you find meaningful ways to connect with the people and principles of our vibrant FUUSE community.

About Unitarian Universalism

Unitarian Universalism creates change: in ourselves, and in the world.

Seven days a week, UUs live their faith by doing. Whether in community or individually, we know that active, tangible expressions of love, justice, and peace make a difference.

Our faith tradition is diverse and inclusive. We grew from the union of two radical Christian groups: the Universalists, who organized in 1793, and the Unitarians, who organized in 1825. They joined to become the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) in 1961. Both groups trace their roots in North America to the early Massachusetts settlers and the Framers of the Constitution. Across the globe, our legacy reaches back centuries to liberal religious pioneers in England, Poland, and Transylvania. Today, Unitarian Universalists include people of many beliefs who share UU values of peace, understanding, and love.

Our Shared Values as Unitarian Universalists



Love is the power that holds us together and is at the center of our shared values. We are accountable to one another for doing the work of living our shared values through the spiritual discipline of Love.

Inseparable from one another, these shared values are:

Interdependence. We honor the interdependent web of all existence. With reverence for the great web of life and with humility, we acknowledge our place in it.

We covenant to protect Earth and all beings from exploitation. We will create and nurture sustainable relationships of care and respect, mutuality and justice. We will work to repair harm and damaged relationships.

Pluralism. We celebrate that we are all sacred beings, diverse in culture, experience, and theology.

We covenant to learn from one another in our free and responsible search for truth and meaning. We embrace our differences and commonalities with Love, curiosity, and respect.

Justice. We work to be diverse multicultural Beloved Communities where all thrive. We covenant to dismantle racism and all forms of systemic oppression. We support the use of inclusive democratic processes to make decisions within our congregations, our Association, and society at large.

Transformation. We adapt to the changing world.

We covenant to collectively transform and grow spiritually and ethically. Openness to change is fundamental to our Unitarian and Universalist heritages, never complete and never perfect.

Generosity. We cultivate a spirit of gratitude and hope.

We covenant to freely and compassionately share our faith, presence, and resources. Our generosity connects us to one another in relationships of interdependence and mutuality.

Equity. We declare that every person is inherently worthy and has the right to flourish with dignity, love and compassion.

We covenant to use our time, wisdom, attention, and money to build and sustain fully accessible and inclusive communities.

At FUUSE we seek to build a caring, inclusive community where we can ground ourselves spiritually, pursue justice in the larger society, and work to heal the natural world.

Sundays at FUUSE

Sunday Services: 9:30 am, September through June Coffee and Conversation following the Service.

FUUSE Worship Services and Religious Education for our children and Youth are offered from September through June. Services begin at 9:30 am, followed by coffee hour at 10:30.

We gather in worship to find meaning and live more deeply. Worship creates connections within, among, and beyond us, calling us to our better selves, calling us to live with wisdom and compassion.

Religious Education for Children and Youth

FUUSE welcomes and encourages family participation of all natures! On Sunday mornings, we welcome all ages to worship together in our sanctuary. We also have a professionally staffed nursery for the youngest children.

Most Sundays, children and adults start worship together in the Sanctuary, where the service will include a "Time For All Ages," often a story or interactive activity. Midway through the service, children are invited to join our RE Director and volunteers for Sunday School classes, where they will continue to explore the same monthly themes as the adults are reflecting upon. The second Sunday of the month is an intentionally multi-generational service, with more embodied and participatory elements; the nursery is open but there is no separate Sunday School.

We will be exploring some new multi-generational and adult religious education offerings this year.

The success of our religious education program depends on the participation of parents and other FUUSE congregants who volunteer to teach, lead, and inspire our children. GOVERNANCE COMMITTEES

While the following governance committees are volunteers, these are elected and appointed positions. Usually, members have been active at FUUSE for a few years before joining these committees.

Board of Trustees

The Board of Trustees oversees the activities and performance of the Minister and of the committees responsible for personnel administration. It is responsible for the Society's legal affairs, as well as for managing its property and financial resources, including the annual operating budget and investment funds. Meetings are open and held the second Thursday of each month from 6:30 to 8:30 PM at the Parsonage.

Finance Committee

The Finance Committee provides financial advice and assistance to the Board of Trustees, while ensuring that all aspects of fiscal execution are in compliance with FUUSE policy and support the FUUSE mission.

Nomination Committee

This Committee is responsible for developing a slate of trustees and standing committee chairs- people and members to be nominated and voted upon at the annual meeting in May/June.

Personnel Committee

This committee oversees the employment of the church staff, excepting the Minister, including advertising for positions, maintaining job descriptions, initiating staff evaluations, and negotiating terms and agreements relating to compensation, benefits, and employment status.

Program Council

The Program Council brings together representatives from *each* of FUUSE's program-related committees, the Minister, and a Board representative to coordinate programs and events that further the mission of FUUSE. Benefits and Responsibilities of Membership

Members of FUUSE consider it their "spiritual home". Members enjoy the benefits of this home and carry the responsibilities for maintaining it.

Benefits:

Our worship services bring us together as a loving community, uplifting our spirits and touching our hearts. They foster our spiritual growth, and challenge us to live our lives according to Unitarian Universalist values. While the Minister leads most of the services, we also enjoy guest preachers and lay led services. In weekly worship, members have opportunities to play many key roles.

We have a unique, interactive children's religious education program that kids like to attend. Through storytelling, role playing, skits and hands-on creative arts, kids learn about other traditions as well as our own, and are encouraged to develop their own personal spiritual path following UU values. Members can help participate in this religious education, under the guidance of the Director of Religious Education. (DRE)

At times there are also opportunities for Adult Religious Education and participation in small group ministries, both of which depend upon the leadership of FUUSE members.

FUUSE has a strong tradition in social action, and in being a catalyst for progressive change in the Exeter area. We have a generous outreach program, through which members support local organizations and individuals in need with gifts of time, money, and resources. We also have an active social justice program, with many opportunities to volunteer and get involved, especially in projects that relate to the environment.

Group and individual social opportunities abound. We encourage potlucks, circle dinners, educational offerings and musical evenings. New friendships are quickly made at FUUSE.

Responsibilities:

Members are expected to participate in Sunday worship and church activities. This is critical to keeping our spiritual community strong.

Members are expected to support FUUSE financially. FUUSE is totally self-supporting. While no specific amounts are prescribed, all members are expected to make a pledge for each fiscal year, from July to June. The members' pledges form the basis for all budgets and financial plans of the church.

Members are encouraged to participate in the democratic governance of the church. This includes attending and voting at the annual meeting (where the budget is approved). We encourage participation in various Committees, Task Forces and small groups where the work of the church is performed.

Members define the vision and the mission of the church, within the broader principles of Unitarian Universalism.

Becoming a Member

Get to know us by attending worship services, coffee hours, potlucks, circle dinners, newcomer tea, classes and other events. If you have children who are interested in attending, check out our Religious Education programs. Introduce yourself to our minister, Rev. Ariel. Fill in a blue card to let us know your interests and sign up for our weekly communication. Stop by our welcome table with any questions.

After attending for a short while if you are interested in joining, please let our Minister or the chair of the Membership Committee know.

Steps for becoming a member

Pathways to Membership: Try to attend our Pathways to Membership class, held in the winter, to learn more about Unitarian Universalism and FUUSE, as well as to build connections with other newcomers.

Meet with the Minister: Reach out to Rev. Ariel (minister@exeteruu.org) to schedule a meeting. This will be an opportunity for them to learn more about you and what draws you to FUUSE, as well as to help connect you with various programs and opportunities in the congregation.

New Member Application. Once completed, this will be sent to the office administrator or minister and ensures we have your complete and up-to-date contact information. When you become a signed member, you will be entered into our registry as a member instead of a friend, and you will be eligible for the semiannual UUA magazine, UU World.

Pledging Commitment: We ask you to estimate the financial support you expect to give the church. Our pledging period occurs in March for the following fiscal year. The congregation adopts a budget in May/June for the new fiscal year (July 1 - June 30) based on expected income, determined by member pledges. We can help you get connected with our Stewardship Committee.

Religious Education: If your children have already been attending Sunday morning programming or youth groups, you may have already enrolled them in the program.

Once you have completed the necessary requirements, you will be invited to sign the membership book and attend the next New Member Welcoming Ceremony, held one or two times a year. New members will be introduced to the congregation during the service.

Join in. Continue to come to services on Sundays and other events throughout the year. Find the areas of our ministry that appeal to you, both as a participant and as a volunteer. Come to congregational meetings to participate in our governance so you can vote and help guide FUUSE. Thank you for being here.
